REGISTER: Please register when you move into the parish. This is an opportunity to become acquainted with our faith community and to experience the joy of being part of the Church. Only registered parishioners, in good standing, can receive a Certificate of Eligibility to act as a Godparent or sponsor.

BAPTISMS: The Sacrament of Baptism is administered on the fourth Sunday of every month at 11:30 a.m. Parents are encouraged to invite family members to the 10:30 Mass as the Sacrament of Baptism takes place immediately following the Mass. Parents and Godparents meet for an enrichment class prior to the Baptism. You will need to call the Parish Office to register for this class. A Godparent must be a committed, practicing Catholic, and if from another parish, must have a certificate of eligibility from his/her pastor. This certificate should be brought to the enrichment class. A Christian of other denominations may serve as a Godparent along with a practicing Catholic.

<u>MARRIAGE</u>: Couples planning marriage are expected to attend Pre-Cana Conferences and to meet with the parish priest several times leading up to the marriage. The period of preparation time required is six months unless approved otherwise by our Pastor.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK: Please call the rectory at any time for the Sacrament of the Sick. Also the Holy Eucharist will be brought to the sick and shut-ins upon request to the Parish Office. We celebrate a Communal Anointing of the Sick in June, near the *Feast of St. John the Baptist*.

Gospel Reflections A Letter from Our Pastor, Father Simi

"I am baptizing you with water, but one mightier than I is coming.
I am not worthy to loosen the thongs of his sandals.
He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire."

Luke 3:16

Dear brothers and sisters.

This Sunday, the third Sunday of Advent is called Gaudete Sunday: Rejoice Sunday. Through these weeks of Advent, of longing, or expectation for the coming of our salvation in Jesus Christ our Lord, we already begin to rejoice. Our longing for Jesus' second coming is one of joyful expectation.

Why? The reason is because we will then fully experience the height of His mercy for each one of us. We joyfully long for His second coming because we know that His work of mercy which He began with His own mother from the moment of her conception, Jesus is going to complete in all of us too.

We saw from last Sunday's gospel how God has begun to reveal His mercy to us through the preparatory work of His servant, John the Baptist. John the Baptist is sent by God into to proclaim repentance and forgiveness. To a very sinful world that has been taken over by sinners.

Civil rulers Tiberius Caesar, Pontius Pilate, Herod, Philip, Lysanias, and religious rulers Annas and Caiaphas, introduced at the beginning of John the Baptist's ministry, will end up to be the same rulers who will put the awaited Messiah to death.

These rulers represent us all. They represent us as sinners, as children of Eve and Adam, all of whom have rejected God, offended God and sinned against Him. Yet it is precisely to us that the Father has sent His Son, not to condemn, but to save. That is why we rejoice.

In today's gospel, we see how John the Baptist is ministering to employees of those same rulers: tax collectors and soldiers. John's presence and ministry to them already points to the way God's mercy is going to be poured out: on everyone, even the hardest of criminals. There is hope for everyone. No one is excluded. This is why we should rejoice.

We know that even Satan was not excluded from God's visitation. The gospels tell us that it was to Satan first that God the Father sent His Son immediately after His public ministry was inaugurated at His baptism in the Jordan by John the Baptist. Jesus was going to deal first and foremost with our captor, the one who has successfully deceived us and imprisoned us. This is why we should rejoice.

This joy which permeates our sinful world is the same joy that will compel us to confidence; confidence in God's mercy. For us then, we confidently expose our every sin to Jesus. We do this confidently because we know He

has come not to condemn us but to forgive us and save us from this sad existence in our barren desert.

This is what Isaiah means when he spoke the words about John the Baptist, words which we heard last Sunday; A voice of one crying out in the desert: "Prepare the way of the Lord, make straight his paths. Every valley shall be filled and every mountain and hill shall be made low. The winding roads shall be made straight, and the rough ways made smooth, and all flesh shall see the salvation of God."

These words speak of haste; the haste of joyful longing to be reunited with the One from who we have separated ourselves. This reunion takes place at Confession and at the Eucharist where all flesh sees the salvation of God in the flesh.

Rejoice my brothers and sisters! Rejoice! $\mathcal{F}r.\ \mathcal{S}imi.$

Mary: The Yes That Changed the World

Mary has a unique and privileged place in salvation history and in the Church. Because she responded yes to becoming the Mother of God, she is our first model of discipleship and our model of grace and trust in God. "Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." Luke 1:38

For centuries, Mary has been a powerful presence in our Church and has inspired generations of believers. Mary's yes to God exemplifies perfect faith and courage.

The *Magnificat*, her beautiful song of praise, speaks of justice, mercy, and peace. It also gives us clues as to how her life of perfect discipleship can inspire us today.

Getting to know Mary and reflecting on her life of faith help us to grow in our own lives. Through Mary we come to deepen our appreciation of the Mystery of the Incarnation: God becoming one of us in order to dwell among us and bring us his salvation.

As individuals and as a parish family, we too are invited to spend some time getting to know Mary. Who is this woman who, at an early age, was full of grace, faith, and trust in God? Who is this parent who taught her child and encouraged him throughout his life? Who is this faithful Jewish woman who watched her son die, yet believed in the promise that his death would bring new life to the world? Who was this person who said yes to God throughout her life?

On the **third Sunday of Advent**, the penitential purple of the season changes to rose and we celebrate "Gaudete" or "Rejoice!" Sunday.

"Draw water joyfully from the font of salvation," says Isaiah. "Rejoice in the Lord always," says St. Paul. "Do penance for the judge is coming," says John the Baptist. Did you know that John the Baptist is the patron saint of spiritual joy? After all, he leapt for joy in his mother's womb at the presence of Jesus and Mary (Luke 1:44). And it says that he rejoices to hear the bridegrooms voice (John 3:29-30). Or to use John's own example, he was like the best man at a wedding. It certainly is an honor to be chosen as "best man." But the best man does not get the bride. According to Jewish custom, the best man's role was to bring the bride to the bridegroom, and then make a tactful exit. And John found joy in this. "My joy is now full. He must increase and I must decrease." John the Baptist was joyful because he was humble. He shows us the true nature of this virtue. Humility is not beating up on yourself, denying that you have any gifts, talents, or importance. John knew he had an important role which he played aggressively, with authority and confidence. The humble man does not sheepishly look down on himself. Actually, he does not look at himself at all. He looks away from himself to the Lord. Proud people are preoccupied with self, seeing all others as competitors. The proud have to perpetually exalt themselves over others in hope that this will provide a sense of worth and inner peace. Of course, it doesn't. Pride always comes before the fall, as it did in the Garden of Eden. Humility brings freedom from this frantic bondage. Receiving one's dignity and self-worth as a gift from God relieves us from this stressful burden. Freed, we can recognize the presence of God and feel a sense of satisfaction when others recognize that God is God and honor him as such. We are now free to recognize godliness in someone else and rejoice when others notice and honor this person too. Repentance is all about humility and humility is all about freedom. And freedom leads to inner peace and joy, joy in the


