REGISTER: Please register when you move into the parish. This is an opportunity to become acquainted with our faith community and to experience the joy of being part of the Church. Only registered parishioners, in good standing, can receive a Certificate of Eligibility to act as a Godparent or sponsor.



BAPTISMS: The Sacrament of Baptism is administered on the fourth Sunday of every month at 11:30 a.m. Parents are encouraged to invite family members to the 10:30 Mass as the Sacrament of Baptism takes place immediately following the Mass. Parents and Godparents meet for an enrichment class prior to the

Baptism. You will need to call the Parish Office to register for this class. A Godparent must be a committed, practicing Catholic, and if from another parish, must have a certificate of eligibility from his/her pastor. This certificate should be brought to the enrichment class. A Christian of other denominations may serve as a Godparent along with a practicing Catholic.



MARRIAGE: Couples planning marriage are expected to attend Pre-Cana Conferences and to meet with the parish priest several times leading up to the marriage. The period of preparation time required is six months unless approved otherwise by our Pastor.



ANOINTING OF THE SICK: Please call the rectory at any time for the Sacrament of the Sick. Also the Holy Eucharist will be brought to the sick and shut-ins upon request to the Parish Office. We celebrate a Communal Anointing of the Sick in June, near the Feast of St. John the Baptist.

Gospel Reflections A Letter from Our Pastor, Father Simi



Dear brothers and sisters,

But I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did! (Luke 13:3)

All of us have certain ideas about ourselves, our own choices and the consequences of those choices. These ideas are being scrutinized during this season of Lent and with particular focus today, the Third Sunday of Lent.

The idea we have about who we are is today questioned by the readings of today's Mass. An honest examination of our conscience will reveal that we are still struggling to determine who we are. We recognize that we are still developing, evolving and becoming.

We also realize that whatever we become at the end of our life here on earth is largely determined by the choices we make. The choices we make are based on a certain vision/understanding of the person we want to become.

These thoughts may seem very philosophical and we may think that most people do not think about these things at all. But we do. All the time. Each and every thought and choice you make seek to bring about a happier you, better you, an eternally happy you. No one seeks to perish.

Yet today's gospel reading shocks us. Just because we have not yet perished like those Galileans who have died horrible deaths at the command of Pilate and even beyond death still faced greater humiliation by having their blood mingled with sacrifices offered to Roman gods, does not mean that we will not perish too.

If our way of thinking does not change, that is, if we do not repent in our way of thinking and in our way of choosing, we will certainly perish too. This is the wakeup call that Jesus is trying to shock us with today.

I am who God says I am. This is the thought that must replace the thought that I am who I say I am. We are not self-made beings. We are not God. This is the truth of who we are as creatures and who God is as Creator.

This truth is being proclaimed in today's first reading: YWHW: "I am who am." Only God can say this because only He exists of His own choosing and not any other.

You and I cannot and did not will ourselves into being. We completely depend on God to do so. We also completely depend on God to determine who we are meant to become and how we will become that.

Just as God sustains the burning tree without consuming it with the fire of His own Being, so does He bring us into existence and sustain us in our existence with the fire of His love without consuming our own existence and our own essence as a separate being.

We completely depend on Him to even exist and to remain in existence. This is the truth proclaimed to us on Ash Wednesday: remember that you are dust and unto dust you will return. It is a very sobering reminder of our utter dependence on God to be anything more than dust.

Yet here we are continually imprisoned by the thought that we do not need God to tell us who we are supposed to be and how we will become it. This is the original sin of Adam and Eve that you and I inherited and are imprisoned by in every fiber of our being.

Instead of becoming the radiant bush that is enflamed but not consumed by God's infinite love, we have become the fruitless fig tree that Jesus mentions in today's gospel.

So what is going to become of us? We repent; that is, we turn to Jesus, the Planter of us. He does not want us to be cut down. He wants to dig around us and fertilize us and make us fruitful again.

How does He do that? He gives Himself to us as 'fertilizer' (life giver) by dying with us and having our lifeless, fruitless blood and body mingled with the sacrifice of His own body and blood that He surrendered on the cross at the command of Pilate.

Till at last we become that burning bush in heaven let us for now repent, repent, and repent.

WHY THE SCRUTINIES in RCIA

Did you know that Lent originated as a time of prayer and fasting for those who were preparing for baptism? The entire Church quickly caught on to the season, but unfortunately the baptismal roots of Lent were forgotten. Following the reforms of Vatican II, the RCIA process was re-introduced. The Church once again walks with the elect toward the great feast of Easter.

Unbaptized persons over the age of 18 who wish to join the Church are enrolled in a process called the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) and for those over the age of 12 we offer Teen RCIA. Those who have never been baptized are called *catechumens* for most of the RCIA process, which lasts at least six months. On the first Sunday of Lent, the catechumens are presented and are enrolled in the Book of the Elect, after which they are called the elect.

The Scrutinies. This is the name given to the three brief ceremonies for those who are preparing for baptism at the Easter vigil. These ceremonies are celebrated on the third, fourth, and fifth Sundays of Lent. At the scrutiny, these people are presented to the Church community, which prays for them, so that they may defeat sin and Satan, successfully endure temptation, and be strengthened in Christ.

Why all this fuss? Why not do all this quietly and privately? Because we are the People of God welcoming new people to our midst. When a person is baptized or received into the Catholic Church, they are received by Christ into his body, the community of faith. We have great cause to rejoice that men and women wish to be part of us, and we celebrate that fact.

It also is a good time to remind ourselves that we have been given the faith by the grace of the Lord acting through the people who brought us to faith. Every time someone joins the Church, it should prompt us to consider whether we are providing encouragement and good example to them. Further, we should pause to remember and to thank God for the good people who taught us the faith, whether they are parents and grandparents, teachers, friends or neighbors. God has worked through them mightily. May he also mightily work through us to share our faith to others!

Please pray for our elect, Cassandra Pena as she continues on her journey toward full communion in the catholic church to be celebrated at our Easter Vigil Mass.

And for our Candidate, Anne Funk who has come back to complete her Sacraments of Intiation. Anne will be receiving

the Sacrament of Confirmation on April 17th along with our parish Confirmation class.
