be a committed, practicing Catholic, and if from another parish, must provide a certificate of eligibility from their pastor. This certificate should be brought to the enrichment class. A Christian of other denominations may serve as a Godparent along with a practicing Catholic.

Matrimony may be celebrated no later than 1pm. Couples planning marriage are to contact the parish office & schedule a meeting with our wedding coordinator no later than 6 months in advance of the wedding. Shorter preparation periods must be approved by our Pastor. Couples will meet

several times with the Pastor throughout the preparation process. Couples are to attend a Pre-Cana program approved by our Pastor.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK: Please call the rectory at anytime



for the Sacrament of the Sick. Also the Holy Eucharist will be brought to the sick and shut-ins upon request to the Parish Office. We celebrate a Communal Anointing of the Sick in June, near the ***Feast of St. John the Baptist.***



SOLEMNITY OF THE MOST HOLY BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST (CORPUS CHRISTI)

As summer officially gets underway this weekend and we celebrate the Solemnity of Corpus Christi, our days of Lenten fasting are long behind us. And yet this Sunday's readings call to mind our experience of fasting during Lent. We fast for many reasons. We may fast to place ourselves in solidarity with those in our world who suffer from involuntary hunger, for example. Or we may fast to help us shift our attention from the trivial toward things that are vitally important. For example, we may fast to remind ourselves of a lesson from this Sunday's first reading: "not by bread alone does one live, but by every word that comes forth from the mouth of the LORD". Most of us do not need to be reminded to eat, but we may need to be reminded of the importance of seeking out that which is "true food" and "true drink".

This Sunday's Gospel reading makes some very strong statements about the importance of the Eucharist: "unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him on the last day. For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink." Similarly the second reading (from the first letter of St. Paul to the Corinthians) speaks of the importance of participation in the body and blood of Christ. "The cup of blessing that we bless, is it not a participation in the blood of Christ? The bread that we break, is it not a participation in the body of Christ?" How are we to understand the use of the word "participate" here? What exactly does it mean to "participate" in the body and blood of Christ?

I think that participation here is best understood in a twofold sense: as a grace and as a calling. First and foremost, participation in the Eucharist is a moment of grace. We "participate" not in the sense of actively accomplishing something for ourselves but rather in sharing in what Christ has accomplished for us. There is really very little for us to do. Our salvation is not something that we earn or accomplish. God's forgiveness is something we receive as a gift. As we participate in the Eucharist we remember and also experience in a real way what God has done for us in Christ.

But to participate in the body and blood of Christ is to do more than to take and eat and praise God for what has been accomplished in Christ. To be called to share in the body and blood of Christ is also to be called to share in his life. Today's gospel passage speaks repeatedly of the importance of recognizing God and Jesus as the source of our own lives. "Unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you do not have life within you" and "Just as the living Father sent me and I have life because of the Father, so also the one who feeds on me will have life because of me." To be alive with the life of Christ is to be animated in a manner marked by his Way. To see God and Jesus as the source of our lives is an invitation to discipleship – to reshape our lives in ways that conform to the source of our being.



PREP

TEACH THE CHILDREN



TO UNDERSTAND THE GOSPEL

Each week, a brief explanation of the following Sunday's Gospel reading will appear below. Teach your child how to look up the Gospel passage in the Bible, have them read it aloud to you, then along with this column, help your child to understand the meaning of Gospel they just read. Let's engage our children and involve them in the Liturgy of the Word.

Gospel Reading for June 10th: Mark 3:20-35

"Whoever does the will of God is brother and sister and mother to me."

A crowd so large has gathered that Jesus and his disciples are not even able to eat. When His family heard of this, they came to take him away because they think he is upset. The scribes think he is possessed by the devil and claim he uses the devil to cast out demons. Jesus points out to them how absurd their statement is by asking, "How can Satan drive out Satan?" It is I (Jesus) who ties up the strong man Beelzebub (Satan), and overcomes him.

He concludes with a brief saying about the forgiveness of sins. All sin can be forgiven except for blasphemy against the Holy Spirit. It's not known exactly what he means by this. It could be that the only sin that can't be forgiven is the one that cuts you off from the source of forgiveness, the Holy Spirit.

Jesus' family arrives but cannot get close to him, they are standing just outside the crowd. Then someone in the crowd shouts out to Jesus, "Your mother and your brother and your sisters are here." This gives Jesus the opportunity to point out that family for him is not based on blood when he replies, "Who is my mother, and who is my brother and my sister? He then points to the crowd seated around him saying, "You are my mother, my brother and my sister."

To walk the path of discipleship, we must each make a conscious choice to follow Jesus. When we are young, our parents make these choices for us. As young people grow in maturity and independence, they begin to make these choices for themselves.

Older children begin to define themselves by the groups to which they belong. In today's Gospel, Jesus makes clear that in choosing to follow him we become more than just part of a group—we join a family.

How to foster a Humble Heart

St. Francis de Sales, a French bishop during the 17th century, wrote a profound spiritual classic called Introduction to the Devout Life. His writing style was unique and communicated his love of the struggling soul who greatly desires to increase in virtue.

Here are five powerful quotes from this spiritual classic, in which de Sales explains how to foster a humble heart.

- 1) Of a truth, nothing so tends to humble us before the Mercy of God as the multitude of His gifts to us; just as nothing so tends to humble us before His Justice as the multitude of our misdeeds.
2) There is no fear that a perception of what He has given you will puff you up, so long as you keep steadily in mind that whatever is good in you is not of yourself ... a lively appreciation of the grace given to you should make you humble, for appreciation begets gratitude.
3) Never cast down your eyes without humbling your heart; and do not pretend to wish to be last and least, unless you really and sincerely mean it.
4) A really humble man would rather that some one else called him worthless and good-for-nothing, than say so of himself; at all events, if such things are said, he does not contradict them, but acquiesces contentedly, for it is his own opinion.
5) The proud man who trusts in himself may well undertake nothing, but the humble man is all the braver that he knows his own helplessness and his courage waxes in proportion to his low opinion of himself, because all his trust is in God, Who delights to show forth His Power in our weakness, His Mercy in our misery.
