**REGISTER:** Please register when you move into the parish. This is an opportunity to become acquainted with our faith community and to experience the joy of being part of the Church. Only registered parishioners, in good standing, can receive a Certificate of Eligibility to act as a Godparent or sponsor.

**BAPTISMS:** The Sacrament of Baptism is administered on the fourth Sunday of every month at 11:30 a.m. Parents are encouraged to invite family members to the 10:30 Mass as the Sacrament of Baptism takes place immediately following the Mass. Parents and Godparents meet for an enrichment class prior to the Baptism. You will need to call the Parish Office to register for this class. A Godparent must be a committed, practicing Catholic, and if from another parish, must have a certificate of eligibility from his/her pastor. This certificate should be brought to the enrichment class. A Christian of other denominations may serve as a Godparent along with a practicing Catholic.

<u>MARRIAGE</u>: Couples planning marriage are expected to attend Pre-Cana Conferences and to meet with the parish priest several times leading up to the marriage. The period of preparation time required is six months unless approved otherwise by our Pastor.

**ANOINTING OF THE SICK:** Please call the rectory at any time for the Sacrament of the Sick. Also the Holy Eucharist will be brought to the sick and shut-ins upon request to the Parish Office. We celebrate a Communal Anointing of the Sick in June, near the *Feast of St. John the Baptist*.

Gospel Reflections A Letter from Our Pastor, Father Simi



Dear Brothers and Sisters,

"Jesus looked at them and said, "
For human beings it is impossible, but not for
God. All things are possible for God."

Mark 10:27

This weekend we welcome a missionary. He is preaching at all the Masses. He reminds us how we are called from the moment of baptism to be first disciples of Jesus whom He then sends out as His missionaries. Fr. Pilla comes to us to remind us of how we all share in Christ's mission to preach the good news to all peoples.

What is the good news? It is this: heaven is possible again. What is heaven? It is this: that we can know God the Father again and develop that intimate relationship again with Him that we were all created for from the beginning. This is the meaning of life.

It is this first relationship that makes possible the fruitfulness and indissolubility of all other relationships. This was the relationship that was broken from the beginning.

In last week's gospel, we heard how Jesus describes our broken relationship with God as a hardening of our hearts to Him: our disobedience, or sin. This hardening of heart was like a tumor that stopped the flow of eternal love from the Father's heart to our hearts, to the hearts of husbands and wives. This was how separation, divorce, remarriage and adultery have broken marriages.

This week we see how a prosperous and moral life is not enough to make us happy. The young man in today's gospel represents all of us. Like him, we think, "If only we do what's right and have all our physical needs taken care of with hard work and the accumulation of wealth, then I and my family should be happy."

We all know that like that young man, it is not necessarily so. Sadness can still be a huge part of our prosperous and moral lives. Such a life is based on our very personal attempts that are not able to persist and lead to happiness because it does not heal the very first relationship that has been broken from the beginning: our relationship with God.

God Himself has to heal that relationship and we must accept Him in order that all our other relationship can then be healed. This alone will lead to our true happiness. Without God, it is impossible for us to be happy in a fruitful and lasting way. Sadness will always somehow overcome all our relationships and good works.

So we see how our Lord Jesus, after having introduced the notion of His suffering, death and resurrection to us, goes first to introducing its healing

effects on marriages, from which all our lives come. Secondly, He now teaches us the healing effects of His passion on our lives as hard working and wealth seeking adults

The young man in the gospel represents that ambitious drive in all of us to achieve and to prosper and be happy. He represents this drive within us to do right and to provide. He also represents for us how all our youthful energy can become futile in arriving at true happiness.

Jesus meets us there today. He looks lovingly at us with His gaze of love, hoping that we would recognize the eternal love of His Father in His eyes. Today, Jesus invites us to follow Him completely and unreservedly. Today, He shows us the way to true happiness by inviting us to love Him above all things.

Today, Jesus offers us the promise of true happiness because He is going to love us with His whole being, by laying down His life for us, by completely immersing Himself into our sadness, the sadness that always leads to our suffering and our death.

Today, Jesus invites us to unite our search and longing for true happiness to Him and His search for us. He invites the young man to give up everything for Him because He Himself is going to give up everything on the cross for us. This is heaven.

"Lord teaches us to love you above all things."

## Pope: the Synod is guided by the action of the Holy Spirit



Pope Francis on Monday described the just opened Ordinary General Assembly of the Synod of Bishops on the Family as an ecclesial expression that is guided by the action of the Holy Spirit.

Greeting participants at the Assembly just before work began on Monday morning, the Pope reminded them that a Synod of Bishops is not a conference, a parlor or a senate during which an agreement is reached.

It is, he said, a "walking together with the spirit of collegiality and synodality" never losing sight of the good of Church and of families.

Noting that the Holy Spirit speaks in the language of all the people of God who never fails to surprise us, the Pope said participants must be armed with apostolic courage, evangelical humility and trusting oration so that the Synod may be a space of action of the Holy Spirit.

The only method to be used, Pope Francis concluded, is to open oneself to the Holy Spirit so that he may guide us and enlighten us.
