REGISTER: Please register when you move into the parish. This is an opportunity to become acquainted with our faith community and to experience the joy of being part of the Church. Only registered parishioners, in good standing, can receive a Certificate of Eligibility to act as a Godparent or sponsor.

BAPTISMS: The Sacrament of Baptism is administered on the fourth Sunday of every month at 11:30 a.m. Parents are encouraged to invite family members to the 10:30 Mass as the Sacrament of Baptism takes place immediately following the Mass. Parents and Godparents meet for an enrichment class prior to the Baptism. You will need to call the Parish Office to register for this class. A Godparent must be a committed, practicing Catholic, and if from another parish, must have a certificate of eligibility from his/her pastor. This certificate should be brought to the enrichment class. A Christian of other denominations may serve as a Godparent along with a practicing Catholic.

<u>MARRIAGE</u>: Couples planning marriage are expected to attend Pre-Cana Conferences and to meet with the parish priest several times leading up to the marriage. The period of preparation time required is six months unless approved otherwise by our Pastor.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK: Please call the rectory at any time for the Sacrament of the Sick. Also the Holy Eucharist will be brought to the sick and shut-ins upon request to the Parish Office. We celebrate a Communal Anointing of the Sick in June, near the *Feast of St. John the Baptist*.

Gospel Reflections A Letter from Our Pastor, Father Simi



Dear Brothers and Sisters,

"For the Son of Man did not come to be served but to serve and to give his life as a ransom for many." (Mark 10:45)

This weekend, our Lord keeps our focus on the central part of His mission here on earth: His suffering, death and resurrection. This is His mission which He has received from His Father. His whole existence is to love and please His Father.

It is the Father's will to restore His relationship with us. This is all that the Father wants. He loves us and misses us. He only desires that we return to Him and to be in a perfect love relationship with Him.

To fulfill this dream, the Father sends us His divine Son to not only shows us how to be in love with the Father, but to enable us to be in love with His Father again. God the Father is going to reveal to us how He loves us and how He wants to loved.

The way He loves us is with His whole being and nothing less. His whole being exists for His own Son. His whole identity is His fatherhood of His Son. I think you parents have an inkling of this kind of love. Your children become your whole existence. They are the reason you are a mother or father.

The Father's whole existence is His Son, Jesus. He is going to love us with nothing less than Jesus Himself. The Father will love us with His whole purpose of existence: His Son. He is going to sacrifice His Son for us.

Remember Abraham? God the Father was from the very beginning giving us a clue on how He is going to love us. Just as Abraham was ready to sacrifice his very own son Isaac to God, God was foreshadowing the sacrifice of His own Son Jesus for us.

The Father sacrifices His Son by having Him drink the cup of all of humanities suffering, pain and death. God the Father was going to show us the depth of love by baptizing (immersing) His very own Son deep into the waters of our own suffering and death.

This is the core of our faith because it is at the core of the Father's love for us. It is the central part of our catholic faith because it is the central part of Jesus' very own love for His Father. He pleases His Father completely by giving His life for us because it will please the Father to then raise us with His Son from all that separates us from Him: sin and death.

Yet the disciples, like us today, did not really quite get this. Like James and John, sons of Zebedee, we do

not really even know what we want. "You do not know what you are asking." (Mark 10: 38) We want to be counted with Jesus in His glory, we just really don't know what that glory is and what it takes to get there.

Jesus glory is His Father. Jesus glory is to please His Father by doing only what the Father wants Him to do. Jesus glory is to obey His Father who wills that He lays down His life as a ransom for us from sin and death. Jesus glory is the cross.

The Zebedee boys had no idea about that kind of loving. We too might have a faint idea but we do not fully appreciate its depth, width, height and length. James and John at first will be repulsed by it all. The cross will first come to them as a scandal, a stumbling block that they will have to overcome.

Jesus, however, is going to teach them and even enable them to not only understand the cross as an act of divine love but will also empower them to love like that. Jesus is going to teach them and empower them to share in His way of loving; the way of the cross.

Jesus will empower us to share in His way of loving but it is going to be a struggle just as it was for the original disciples. The struggle will be with drinking the cup of suffering that Jesus chooses to drink and being immersed in the suffering and death that Jesus obediently and lovingly immerses Himself in.

Love seeks not special places of honor. It seeks only to please the Father.

Was Jesus a pessimist or a stark realist?

On three different occasions the Gospels record that Jesus predicted he would endure great suffering through betrayal, rejection, and the punishment of a cruel death. The Jews resorted to stoning and the Romans to crucifixion, the most painful and humiliating death they could devise for criminals they wanted to eliminate. No wonder the apostles were greatly distressed at such a prediction! If Jesus their Master were put to death, then they would likely receive the same treatment by their enemies. Jesus called himself the "Son of Man" because this was a common Jewish title for the Messiah. Why must the Messiah be rejected and killed? Did not God promise that his Anointed One would deliver his people from their oppression and establish a kingdom of peace and justice? The prophet Isaiah had foretold that it was God's will that the "Suffering Servant" make atonement for sins through his suffering and death (Isaiah 53:5-12). Jesus paid the price for our redemption with his blood. Slavery to sin is to want the wrong things and to be in bondage to destructive desires. The ransom Jesus paid sets us free from the worst tyranny possible-- the tyranny of sin and the fear of death. Jesus' victory did not end with death but triumphed over the tomb. Jesus defeated the powers of death through his resurrection. Jesus also used stark language to explain what kind of sacrifice he had in mind. His disciples must drink his cup if they expect to reign with him in his kingdom. The cup he had in mind was a bitter one involving crucifixion. What kind of cup does the Lord have in mind for us? For some disciples such a cup entails physical suffering and the painful struggle of martyrdom. But for many, it entails the long routine of the Christian life, with all its daily sacrifices, disappointments, set-backs, struggles, and temptations. A disciple must be ready to lay down his or her life in martyrdom and be ready to lay it down each and every day in the little and big sacrifices required. An early church father summed up Jesus' teaching with the expression: to serve is to reign with Christ. We share in God's reign by laying down our lives in humble service as Jesus did for our sake. Are you willing to lay down your life and to serve others as Jesus did?

Let us pray..."Lord Jesus, your death brought life and freedom. Make me a servant of your love that I may seek to serve rather than be served." Amen.
