Matrimony may be celebrated no later than 1pm. Couples planning marriage are to contact the parish office & schedule a meeting with our wedding coordinator no later than 6 months in advance of the wedding. Shorter preparation

periods must be approved by our Pastor. Couples will meet several times with the Pastor throughout the preparation process. Couples are to attend a Pre-Cana program approved by our Pastor.

God's Love Is For Everybody

Gospel of Matthew 15: 21-28

In today's "politically correct" conscious world, the readings for today might be classified as "exclusive" versus "inclusive."

The Jews always considered themselves as special in the eyes of God and rightly so, because it was through them that Jesus came to be. Our religious faith, history and traditions are based on what the Jews gave us. However, they also considered God as their own to the exclusion of everyone else. This was not God's or Jesus' intention. The ultimate objective of God was "that all might be One" through Jesus Christ. (John 17:21)

In the First Reading, the Prophet Isaiah, is preaching to the returned Babylonian Exiles who brought with them many foreigners — friends, relatives and slaves. Tensions developed between these newcomers and those who had never left Israel. The prophet is telling everyone that God accepts all those who are willing to follow God's laws with sincerity and purity of heart. Together they may enter the temple — "His house of prayer."

In the Second Reading, St. Paul's is frustrated with the Jews for not accepting Jesus Christ as their Lord and Messiah. He tells us that their rejection of Christ resulted in their loss but our (Gentiles) gain of salvation; but when they do come to accept Christ (as is ultimately predicted), it will be for the glory of all mankind.

And then in Mathew's Gospel, This passage has some strange language in it, especially from Jesus. Our society today has some equally strange (and derogatory) names for people of other races or ethnic origins, all of which are wrong. However, in Jesus' time, calling gentiles "dogs" was part of their "exclusive" cultural pride. Jesus tells the Canaanite woman that His mission is "only to the lost sheep of Israel." If Jesus were only a Jew this would have been enough and the encounter would have ended there. But Jesus was God and the love of God knows no cultural or ethnic limits. He sees into the heart of this foreign woman and, in spite of "His mission," He grants her request because her faith was stronger than both cultures.

We should take courage from these readings because they tell us that God wants all mankind to be happy with Him in heaven at the end of time. There are no limits to race, creed or ethnic origin, as God tell us in the above passage from Isaiah, "All those who keep the Sabbath and hold to my covenant, I will bring them to my holy mountain, heaven." Just something to think about during your prayer time this week!

"HALLOW" the #1 Catholic APP!

The Catholic meditation app **Hallow**, started in 2018 with a focus on young adults now...has Parents, Grandparents, just about any age group who uses it is hooked.


Hallow's creation is integrated with CEO & Co-Founder Alex Jones' own faith journey. His family raised him Catholic, but he strayed from the faith in high school and college where he went through a relatively dark time in life. After he graduated from college, he wanted to figure out what he believed in. One thing that had always fascinated him was meditation. He noticed that whenever he meditated, his mind would be pulled to something spiritual. So Alex asked priests, nuns and others in religious life, *is there a specific connection between meditation and faith?* They told him that indeed there was a connection: **It was called prayer.**

A priest friend encouraged him to listen more during prayer, and he began to study the Catholic faith more and he tried "**Lectio Divina**," a meditative reflection on the Scriptures. Alex said this process actually led him to tears and eventually brought him back to his faith. It was a beautiful combination of this deep sense of peace and love that calms our head space.

Jones recalled meditating on the **Lord's Prayer** and the word that stuck out to him was "**hallow**" from the beginning of the prayer: "*Our Father who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name.*" He knew what hallow meant, to make holy or sacred, but he didn't know how it pertained to his life. He pondered if he should be helping others grow in holiness. **And that's how the Hallow app came to be. "It's very important to us that everything on the app is 100% authentically Catholic and in line with church teachings."** The app's developers worked with priests, bishops and theologians to ensure they are conveying Catholic teachings correctly.

The impact of COVID-19 on **Hallow's** popularity has been huge. During the pandemic it has provided us with an opportunity to work on our spiritual lives from home. The app has a "**Family**" feature that allows users to connect with family and friends and share prayers, reflections and prayer intentions with them even while being physically separated. It also has a feature called the "**Daily Minute Prayer Challenge**." "**The hardest part about praying is just doing it.**" **You can set goals on the app. You can add members of your family and friends to the app to hold yourself accountable. You can set daily reminders.**

Unlike other religious apps that have users glued to their screen to read the Bible, **Hallow** allows its users to press "play," close their eyes and listen to audio of a prayer.

ARE CATHOLIC FLAME WARS EVANGELIZING ONLINE? BISHOP BARRON SAYS 'NO'

Bishop Robert Barron, an auxiliary bishop of Los Angeles, issued a "*pastoral cry of the heart*" to encourage Catholics to stop tearing each other apart online and instead provide well structured and charitable arguments. "*I understand that people are passionate, especially about religious matters, but when it comes to this commentary we always must keep truth and love in the forefront,*" he said.

In an article Barron had written, which he said drew unhealthy criticism from mobs of Catholics who responded not with arguments, but with vicious insults. For four days, the bishop had to assign co-workers to assess and remove disturbing comments from his different social media pages, he said.

"In the wake of my article, armies of commenters, encouraged by certain internet provocateurs, inundated my Twitter and all my social media sites with wave upon wave of the most hateful, vituperative, venomous words that you can imagine." In the article, "**Why 'what are the bishops doing about it?' is the wrong question,**" Barron noted Catholics had been calling for a greater contribution from the bishops against racial injustices, including the death of George Floyd. He said bishops are lobbying politicians, encouraging legislative changes, and calling on community leaders. However, he said there must be footwork done by the laity as well. In his video, Barron said that online mob comments and abusive reviews do not help promote change but are, instead, anti-evangelical. If non-Catholics who are curious about the faith were to observe such behavior, he said, they would be repelled by the insidious comments of Catholics toward their pastors. Catholics should be examples of charity, and model respectful disagreement within the Catholic community.

"Catholics on social media," Barron concluded, "you need to pick up your game."
