
BAPTISMS: The Sacrament of Baptism is administered on the fourth Sunday of every month. Sacrament of Baptism

THE WORLD'S GREATEST "YES"

"Behold, I am the handmaid of the Lord. May it be done to me according to your word." ~Luke 1: 37

Gabriel's brief announcement to Mary foretells the advent of someone absolutely unique: the Davidic king who will rule over all the nations, the one who would save mankind from their sins ("Jesus" means "God saves"), and the one who would fulfill all the Old Testament prophecies about the reunification of Israel and Judah (the "House of Jacob"). The entire gospel is packed into this Annunciation of the Archangel Gabriel to Mary.

Christmas, the part of Christ's life this Gospel passage is connected to, presents us with the mystery of God who became man, but it also includes the mystery of man cooperating in the saving action of God. God sends his messenger to Mary in order to invite her to become the mother of the Savior. When God asked her to take on a role in his plan of salvation, she said yes!

Don't mistake her question to the Archangel Gabriel as doubt. Her question, "But how can this come about, since I am a virgin?" Mary was merely asking what God wanted her to do – she had promised her virginity to God, and she wanted to know if God was asking her something else. She didn't doubt God's wisdom or power; she just wanted more instructions.

We can learn no greater lesson than how to say yes to God. Mary's "yes" reversed Eve's "no," and paved the way for Christ's undoing of Adam's fall. Likewise, when God disrupts our lives – through the voice of conscience, the normal responsibilities and demands of our state in life, or the indications of Church teaching – our "yes" can echo Mary's and make more room for Christ in this fallen world. But our "no" – or even our "maybe" – can just as easily shut him out.

Let us pray...

Thank you for making me a Christian. You are the one Savior, the promised Messiah, and your Kingdom will have no end. You have called me into your Kingdom. What more could I ask for? You have given me your friendship. Lord, teach me to live closer to you, to seek the Father's will as you do, and to see all things with your eyes. Amen

Ask these powerful patrons to intercede for our beloved elderly family and friends.

This year has been particularly difficult on the elderly. There have been many deaths from COVID-19 among seniors, and the loneliness from self-isolation from lockdowns and social distancing has left the already-vulnerable older members of our society in need of support and prayer.

When praying for the beloved elderly members of our family and community, let's turn to these powerful intercessors to ask for peace, hope, and protection ...

St. Anthony - to protect the vulnerable. The popular saint, born in Portugal but serving in Padua, commonly helps locate lost objects, but he's also a patron of the elderly, as he spent much of his time devoted to the more vulnerable members of society. St. Padre Pio - for reassurance and faith. Known for his profound faith, the Italian friar suffered from many health issues in his life. Through his pain, he also had to contend with the public response to his ability to bi-locate and his stigmata. It wasn't an easy road but he found peace and comfort in his prayer life. He is the perfect saint to intercede for those who may need reassurance.

St. Thérèse de Lisieux - for anxiety. From a very young age, this French Carmelite nun suffered from a form of intense anxiety called scrupulosity. Certain that she'd sinned when she had not she only found peace in confession, or from her sisters' affirmation. This anxiety tied her up in knots, so she can certainly understand the fears of our seniors and intercede on their behalf.

St. Dymphna - for depression. Being lonely can lead to depression. This 7th-century Irish saint is the perfect saint to call on when struggling with mental health issues. She fled her home to escape her father's assault, and he eventually found and killed her. Many healing miracles have been attributed to her.

St. Corona - to end the pandemic. It seems only fitting during this pandemic to call on the help of this 2nd-century saint whose relics lie in the north of Italy. In Austria and Bavaria she is called upon in the event of a pandemic, so pray for her intercession to help those affected by COVID-19, and for an end to it as soon as possible.

Religious and civic leaders still hope the meaning of the Nativity will shine forth from the town of Jesus' birth.

If the Holy Family had a hard time finding an inn to stay in when Jesus was about to be born, it is the inns of Bethlehem themselves that are having the difficulty this year. The COVID-19 pandemic has disrupted life in the Holy Land so much that tourism and religious pilgrimage there are practically non-existent. The Church of the Nativity is closed to the public, as are many other religious sights.

A Christmas tree lighting will be limited to 15 guests, including the Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem, Pierbattista Pizzaballa, and other clergy and civic officials. Midnight Mass, presided over by the Latin Patriarch, has also been scaled back, Salman said. The event will be closed to the general public but broadcast live for people to watch.

"Christmas from Bethlehem this year will still contain "a message of hope to the whole world, that the world will recover from this pandemic."

Local religious leaders concur. As the Custodian of the Holy Land, Franciscan Fr. Francesco Patton, presided over several traditional services to open the Advent season as he told worshipers.
