

Certificates of Eligibility: Issued to registered parishioners, 16 yrs. and older, received all of their Sacraments of Initiation, attend MASS regularly at St. John's, and receive the sacraments of Communion and Penance often.

BAPTISMS: The Sacrament of Baptism is administered on the fourth Sunday of every month. Sacrament of Baptism



must provide a Certificate of Eligibility from their pastor. A Christian of other denominations may serve as a Godparent along with a practicing Catholic.

MARRIAGE: A Saturday Mass for the Sacrament of Matrimony may be celebrated no later than

1pm. Couples planning marriage are to contact the parish office & schedule a meeting with our wedding coordinator no later than 6 months in advance of the wedding. Shorter preparation

periods must be approved by our Pastor. Couples will meet several times with the Pastor throughout the preparation process. Couples are to attend a Pre-Cana program approved by our Pastor.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK: Please call the rectory at any time for the Sacrament of the Sick. Also the Holy Eucharist will be brought to the sick and shut-ins upon request to the Parish Office. We celebrate a Communal Anointing of the Sick in June, near the Feast of St. John the Baptist.

A HEALING ENCOUNTER

Gospel of Mark 1:29-39

In today's Gospel, Jesus begins His *healing ministry*, this very first recorded account of the miracle of healing Simon's mother-in-law.

Saint Mark narrates that in Simon's (Peter) house, his mother-in-law lay sick with a fever. They tell Jesus about her as soon as He enters this home. Jesus then grasps her hand, helps her up, and her fever disappears. Once her health gets restored, she "waited" on them, serving Jesus with His Apostles at the table.

Cured from her illness, she used her newfound health and life to serve Jesus, in a humble yet meaningful way she could. In those early days, it was not customarily allowed for a man, let alone a holy man like Jesus, to be served by a woman not of kin. But this woman's desire to give thanks to the Lord knew no boundaries. She understood that God's will restored her health so that she would use her new life to serve Him and other people.

I can't help but wonder, especially in the world in which we live today, how many of us were cured from an illness, whether light or grave, and saw our healing as a call from God?


How many of us prayed the proverbial "foxhole prayers" calling out to our Lord for healing of a loved one, and then when our miraculous prayers have been answered, the memory fads quickly and we return to our everyday lives.


God does not want us to simply have fun while we have the strength of health. He is calling us to use our health for a greater purpose; to serve Him and others. The will He has for those of good health, and for all of us who are alive, even if sickly, is that we use our lives for the good, glorifying Him and serving others, according to our own capacities.

Notice that throughout the Readings today, the theme is 'being called by God, and responding to do His will.'

Knowing and understanding what God desires of us is truly important, yet often overlooked. Amidst all the noises and distractions in life, it takes constant prayer on our part to be receptive to what God is really telling us. And whenever we hear God calling us, and we feel the Holy Spirit prompting us, it is through prayer and the Sacraments that we would have the strength and faith to answer the Lord like Samuel did, "Speak, for your servant is listening" (1 Samuel 3:10).

Children's Reflection - Gospel of Mark 1:29-39 JESUS HEALS US

Right after Jesus chose his disciples he visited the home of Simon and Andrew, with James & John, two of his new disciples. When they got there they saw that Simon's mother-in-law was very sick with a fever. Jesus went to her, took her by the hand and helped her up and she was instantly healed. She then went into the kitchen to cook dinner and serve them. The disciples were so amazed that they told everyone nearby what Jesus had done! One, by one people who were sick, came to be healed. Jesus cured many who were sick with various diseases, and he drove out many who were sick with unclean spirits (demons). Very early in the morning, before anyone else got up, Jesus went off to a deserted place, where he prayed.

Simon and those who were with him earlier went after him, and on finding him said, "Everyone is looking for you." Jesus told them, "Let us go on to the nearby villages that I may preach there also. For it is this purpose have I come." So he went into their synagogues, preaching and driving out demons throughout the all of Galilee. But how did he do this? We must remember that even though Jesus was here on earth with us for a short time as a man, Jesus is God, the Son of God Our Father in heaven. Jesus was sent to save us from our sins and to teach us how to love one another...how to live as children of God. If we let him, Jesus can change our hearts. He taught us that to be forgiven, we must ask for forgiveness when we make mistakes. He also taught us that we must forgive others when they make mistakes, even when they hurt us. This is another way Jesus heals us. Through the Sacrament of Confession. Jesus knew it was important to change our hearts so we could be saved and reach our goal, to get to heaven and live in the Kingdom of God for all eternity.
