

### A Reflection on the Gospel Mark 3:20-35

How do we know if something is of God or not? The Gospel of Mark is about the movement of the Holy Spirit in the lives of humanity. Jesus has just started his ministry and we are only three chapters into the Gospel of Mark, and so far he has healed St. Peter's Mother-in-law (Mark 1), preached repentance and forgiveness of sins, healed a paralytic, a leper and a man with a withered hand, and has engaged the Pharisees about questions of the Sabbath. In all this time of healing, preaching, and giving people good news of God's love, there have been two groups that are not so sure about him: his family and the religious authorities.

Mark says that Jesus' relatives "set out to seize him" for they say, "he is out of his mind." What Mark is suggesting is that Jesus has a more heightened consciousness than those around him. His relatives fear being rejected by the scribes and when they realize they can no longer control him, advise Mary to do as they as distance herself from Jesus.

When the scribes say that Jesus must be possessed by Satan in order to drive out Satan, their statement allows for Mark to present to us more on Jesus' teaching on forgiveness.

Jesus summons them and speaks to them in parables, "How can Satan drive out Satan?" "If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand" and "no one can enter a strong man's house to plunder his property unless he first ties up the strong man." Jesus' final words here are about forgiveness – that "all sins and all blasphemies" will be forgiven except the blasphemy "against the Holy Spirit." Jesus adds a statement that shocks us at first: "whoever blasphemes against the Holy Spirit never has forgiveness." So Jesus by driving out the unclean spirits can restore people to their original wholeness. Sinners are invaded and bound by Satan; Jesus sets them free.

That does not mean that there are any limits to the mercy of God (CCC 1864). Rather, the only sin that cannot be forgiven is the deliberate refusal to accept the mercy offered through the Holy Spirit.

In the final section of chapter 3, Mark shows Jesus redefining the meaning of family. When one in the crowd tells Jesus his mother and brother and sister are here, One might think Jesus was rejecting His Mother when looks at the crowd gathered around him and says, "You are my mother, and you are my brothers and sisters." Some take this to mean that Jesus has brothers and sisters. For the Hebrews during that time, extended family was referred to as your brothers and sisters. Mark initiates that people cannot labeled according to prefixed assumptions, they can only be defined by what they do. Jesus was teaching dramatically, and comparing two things, the dignity of being physically the Mother of God, and the privilege of hearing the word of God and keeping it. Jesus said it best, "My mother, brothers and sisters are those who do the will of God."

We must imitate those who sat at Jesus' feet. For, as He said, "Whoever does the will of God is my brother, and sister, and mother."

Each week, a brief explanation of the following Sunday's Gospel reading will appear below. Teach your child to look up the Gospel passage in the Bible, have them read it aloud to you, then along with this column, help your child to understand the meaning of Gospel they just read. Let's engage our children and involve them in the Liturgy of the Word at Mass each week.

# Gospel for June 17<sup>th</sup>: Mark 4:26-34 "The Reign of God is like a Mustard Seed."

Jesus uses two parables about seeds to teach us about the Kingdom of God and about our faith.

1st Parable: Jesus says "this is how it is with the kingdom of God." A man scatters seed which over time sprouts and develops. Then when the grain is ripe, the man harvests his crop. The emphasis is on the seed, which seems to have the power to grow on its own. In this it is like the Kingdom of God. While on earth, Jesus planted the seeds of the kingdom by his life, miracles, teaching, and suffering. However, the kingdom is not yet fully established. Although already present in Jesus and his group of twelve, it has yet to come to fruition; just as the seed in the parable needs time to grow, so does God's kingdom. 2nd Parable: Here the focus is on the tiny mustard seed. Though not the smallest of all seeds, it is most likely the smallest that a first-century farmer in Jesus' part of the world would have sown. Small as the mustard seed is, it develops into a tree. Though the mustard tree generally averages only nine to twelve feet in height, it has a wide expanse and provides a nesting place for birds. Just as the tree welcomes the birds, so is God's kingdom welcoming and open to many.

Explain: Jesus came to establish the Kingdom of God on earth. This kingdom is present in the Church today, but it is still in process. Because we are the Church, we bear the responsibility of continuing the work of Jesus and his disciples. Jesus counts on us to continue his work. We must sow the seeds by spreading his word and making him known. We do this by living Christ-like lives, by reaching out to others, by inviting others into the kingdom. Just as small seeds grow over time, so our small acts of kindness today have the possibility of making a big difference in the future. God's kingdom is not yet fully established. It is growing and will come to fullness at the end of time. How rewarding to know that we are helping make it happen. Action: Pray "The Lord's Prayer" together as a family.
