Matrimony may be celebrated no later than 1pm. Couples planning marriage are to contact the parish office & schedule a meeting with our wedding coordinator no later than 6 months in advance of the wedding. Shorter preparation

periods must be approved by our Pastor. Couples will meet several times with the Pastor throughout the preparation process. Couples are to attend a Pre-Cana program approved by our Pastor.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK: Please call the rectory at any



time for the Sacrament of the Sick. Also the Holy Eucharist will be brought to the sick and shut-ins upon request to the Parish Office. We celebrate a Communal Anointing of the Sick in June, near the *Feast of St. John the Baptist.*

BE NOT AFRAID

Gospel of Matthew 10: 26-33

As we saw last week, the commission of the Twelve is addressed to all baptized Christians. Continuing his instruction, Jesus tells the apostles, "What I say to you in the darkness, speak in the light; what you hear whispered, proclaim on the housetops."

Jesus warns the apostles, "And do not be afraid of those who kill the body but cannot kill the soul, rather be afraid of the one (Satan) who can destroy both soul and body in Gehenna (Hell)."

In the early centuries, the fact that so many men and women, young and old, were ready to face a terrible death, rather than renounce their faith, so impressed their pagan neighbors that it led many of them to embrace the Christian faith. Martyrdom has been a continuing fact of the Church's life during the past century. Most of us will not have to face this ultimate test. But on the other hand, this is a world that does not embrace Christianity and likely one day, we will all be called to "acknowledge before others" our belief, our faith, our God. For many there will be a price to pay. The loss of a spouse, children, family, friends, your job. But it is Jesus who encourages those who must overcome their 'fear', as they give witness to all that he stands for.

"Are not two sparrows sold for a small coin? Yet not one of them falls to the ground without your Father's knowledge. Even all the hairs of your head are counted. So do not be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows."

Our essential Christian witness will not be given in the market place, but in the informal exchanges that are a constant part of life. In the discussions that lead to family decisions, in our work place conversations, and in the attitudes that people know are the expression of Catholic conviction. It will not be so much what we say, as the respect and friendliness with which we express ourselves that matters. Always have your answer ready for the people who ask you the reason for the hope that you have, but give it with courtesy and respect, and with a clear conscience.

Rosary walk in city brings prayer, healing to troubled streets



Some 200 area faithful took to the streets of downtown Philadelphia on Sunday afternoon, June 7 for a "Rosary Walk for Healing and Peace" in a city and nation beset by disease and division. The two-hour procession was led by Father Dennis Gill, director of the archdiocesan Office for Divine Worship and rector of the Cathedral Basilica of SS. Peter and Paul, which was the starting point for the event.

"We come together to pray for many things today," said Father Gill, stressing the intercessory power of Jesus before God the Father, and of Mary "who brings all of our needs to her divine Son." Before setting out, attendees recited the chaplet of Divine Mercy, led by event organizer David Sao of the Culture Project, a Wynnewood-based young adult ministry. Sao knelt on the steps of the cathedral throughout the chaplet, with several others doing the same on the pavement and street behind him.

Archbishop Nelson Perez joined the participants for the length of the walk, as did Archbishop Borys Gudziak, metropolitan archbishop of the Ukrainian Catholic Church in the United States, and Philadelphia Auxiliary Bishop Edward Deliman.

EUCHARISTIC MIRACLES



Throughout history, though, many people have reported miracles that brought them back to the truth. The Church has recognized over one hundred Eucharistic miracles, many of which occurred during times of weakened faith in transubstantiation.

One of the earliest was recorded by the Desert Fathers in Egypt, who were among the first Christian monks. One of these monks had doubts about the Real Presence of Jesus in the consecrated bread and wine. Two of his fellow monks prayed for his faith to be strengthened, and they all attended Mass together. According the account they left behind, when the bread was placed on the altar, the three men saw a small child there. When the priest put out his hand to break the bread, an angel descended with a sword and poured the child's blood into the chalice. When the priest cut the bread into small pieces, the angel also cut the child into pieces. When the men drew near to receive Communion, the skeptical man alone received a morsel of bloody flesh. Seeing this, he became afraid and cried out: "Lord, I believe that this bread is your flesh and this chalice your blood." Immediately the flesh became bread, and he took it, giving thanks to God.

The other monks then had a great insight into the miracle that takes place at each Mass. They explained, "God knows human nature and that man cannot eat raw flesh, and that is why he has changed his body into bread and his blood into wine for those who receive it in faith."
