TO LIVE AS A DISCIPLE Gospel of Matthew 10: 37-42

Two weeks ago we heard Jesus commission the twelve apostles and last week we heard some of His instructions to them. This week we hear the conclusion of His instructions.

In Matthew 10:37 Jesus uses the words, "not worthy of me," this warning talks of a great sacrifice many will face in picking up our cross to follow Him. The **decision** to follow Jesus and become a member of His covenant family may cause a break in the bonds within our own families. In asking us to pick up our cross, Jesus is inviting His disciples to follow Him in the announcing of the Kingdom, in His healing ministry, in His suffering, and ultimately in His glory. Jesus' command to be willing to take up one's cross to follow Him is essential to being a true disciple – so much so that it is repeated twice in each of the Synoptic Gospels (Mt 10:38 and 16:24; Mk 8:34 and 10:21; Lk 9:23 and 14:27).

The point Jesus is making, is this... Jesus carries the word of God the Father to the disciples, and His disciples will carry His word out into the world. Therefore, whoever receives the disciples is in effect is receiving Jesus, and since Jesus' is from the Father, those who receive the disciples are receiving the Father and will be rewarded by Him.

Jesus defines what living in "righteousness" means in His Sermon on the Mount, in living the Beatitudes.

Jesus goes on to tells us, "And whoever gives only a cup of cold water to one of these little ones to drink because he is a disciple, amen, I say to you, he will surely not lose his reward."

These "little ones" are Jesus' disciples who serve the Father by announcing the coming of the kingdom.

The reward of "eternal life" is promised to those who pick up their cross, live a righteous life, and continue on the path of the Great Commission – to carry the Word of God out into the world.

Freedom to Worship

from USCCB

"A Basic Duty Every Human Person Owes To God is Regular Worship"

On December 7, 1965, the Second Vatican Council approved *Dignitatis humanae*, the Declaration on Religious Liberty.

The document roots religious freedom in the perennial teaching of the Church on human dignity. It teaches that religious freedom is the cornerstone of a society that promotes human dignity; it is a fundamental human right, which follows on the duty of all people to seek the truth about God.

Excerpt from the Encyclical Letter *Redemptor Hominis* of Pope St. John Paul II

"Certainly the curtailment of the religious freedom of individuals and communities is not only a painful experience but it is above all an attack on man's very dignity, independently of the religion professed or of the concept of the world which these individuals and communities have. The curtailment and violation of religious freedom are in contrast with man's dignity and his objective rights. The Council document mentioned above states clearly enough what that curtailment or violation of religious freedom is. In this case we are undoubtedly confronted with a radical injustice with regard to what is particularly deep within man, what is authentically human." (No. 17)

"Nowadays it is sometimes held, though wrongly, that freedom is an end in itself, that each human being is free when he makes use of freedom as he wishes, and that this must be our aim in the lives of individuals and societies. In reality, freedom is a great gift only when we know how to use it consciously for everything that is our true good. Christ teaches us that the best use of freedom is charity, which takes concrete form in self-giving and in service. For this "freedom Christ has set us free" and ever continues to set us free. The Church draws from this source the unceasing inspiration, the call and the drive for her mission and her service among all mankind. The full truth about human freedom is indelibly inscribed on the mystery of the Redemption." (No. 21)

Decline in Confession Clogs Church's Arteries

"Sin is like spiritual cholesterol, and the arteries (of the church) are clogged," "This is a hidden spiritual reality, but it actually explains why there's so little life."

The lines for confession have been shrinking for years. The data that really shocked Meghan Cokeley, Evangelization Dir for the Diocese, came from a recent five-year study by the Malvern-based Catholic Leadership Institute (CLI), which surveyed some 17,000 practicing Catholics from the archdiocesan area.

The faithful who avoid confession should be reassured that "conversion is not condemnation," but rather a call to healing and hope in Christ. "Seventy-five percent of them reported that they go to confession once or twice a year or never, and that 'never' portion was almost 30%." "These are regular Mass-goers … our ministry leaders, parish council members, finance council people."

"The Gospel is conversion, turning away from sin and being faithful to the Gospel, part of the problem, is due to "a very comfortable Catholicism" that prevails in parishes and in the overall culture. There's just this logic that somehow ... Jesus exists to make me feel good about myself. That kind of individualism and selfaffirmation have profound social consequences, said Cokeley. If we ourselves aren't dealing with our sin regularly, we're not going to have this healthy responsiveness to the evil that we're seeing around us. Although they're not in line for confession, many Catholics – about 89%, according to Pew's 2015 study, believe sin exists. But fear and shame often keep faithful away from the sacrament. Conversion is not condemnation. We have to start talking about the call to conversion as an expression of Christ's love, that he wants our burdens pulled off of us, and he wants our

wants our burdens pulled off of us, and he wants our chains broken. Addressing sin is an "unbinding of the heart," which is why the pivotal aspect of the sacrament is "not the confessing, but the receiving of grace to break the chain, to walk away from it." When the priest utters those words, 'I absolve you' – that word literally means to break. So when he speaks those words, the chains are broken, and it doesn't have anything to do with how we feel about it. It actually happens."

A reawakening to the need for regular confession is crucial for the spread of the Gospel. When we're introducing people to the person of Christ, it has to be the real Jesus."

For both first-time and lifelong penitent, the sacrament of reconciliation is one of healing and hope, she said.

Encountering Christ is a "radical, beautiful call ... that really fulfills the deepest desires of our hearts," said Cokeley.
