

Certificates of Eligibility: Issued to registered parishioners, 16 yrs. and older, received all of their Sacraments of Initiation, attend MASS regularly at St. John's, and receive the sacraments of Communion and Penance often.

**BAPTISMS:** The Sacrament of Baptism is administered on the fourth Sunday of every month. Sacrament of Baptism



must provide a Certificate of Eligibility from their pastor. A Christian of other denominations may serve as a Godparent along with a practicing Catholic.

MARRIAGE: A Saturday Mass for the Sacrament of Matrimony may be celebrated no later than 1pm. Couples planning marriage are to contact the parish office & schedule a meeting with our wedding coordinator no later than 6 months in advance of the wedding. Shorter preparation

periods must be approved by our Pastor. Couples will meet several times with the Pastor throughout the preparation process. Couples are to attend a Pre-Cana program approved by our Pastor.



**ANOINTING OF THE SICK:** Please call the rectory at any time for the Sacrament of the Sick. Also the Holy Eucharist will be brought to the sick and shut-ins upon request to the Parish Office. We celebrate a Communal Anointing of the Sick in June, near the Feast of St. John the Baptist.

The entirety of today's Gospel selection from John 3:16-21 should be firmly in our minds. There is so much here, especially about our relationship with faith and deed.

Christ does not want the world to suffer; John 3:17 makes clear that salvation is possible for the whole world. We should do what we can to spread the word to as much of the world as we can. God wants the whole world saved, and it falls to those of us outside of and within the fold to do what we can to make this happen. We are tellers of truth. People preferred darkness. We as Christians have chosen a lighter path, but at the time of the Crucifixion, the crowds wanted Barabbas, and there are still far too many people today who want Barabbas. We should remain ever humble in our hopes that those who have yet to see the light do so before it is too late.

If you read the fullness of this most-beloved Gospel selection, there is a clear and distinct association between works and deeds.

"For everyone who does wicked things hates the light and does not come toward the light, so that his works might not be exposed. But whoever lives the truth comes to the light, so that his works may be clearly seen as done in God."

It's true that we cannot "buy" our way into heaven with good deeds; rather, good deeds are a result of living a true, honest, considered life with Christ. And when we're trying to form lives with Jesus, performing Christ-focused good works can develop the discipline and habits needed to live as free from sin as we possibly can.

Accept Christ in your heart and know that through him salvation is possible. But it is in deeds that the light of Christ is brought into the world.

As Pope Francis said on July 21, 2013, "In our Christian life . . . may prayer and action always be deeply united. A prayer that does not lead you to practical action for your brother — the poor, the sick, those in need of help, a brother in difficulty — is a sterile and incomplete prayer." So, then, may the truth of God's love for the world spur us to joy, to hope for salvation for all, and – perhaps most importantly – to action.

# TEACH the CHILDREN T

Today, at about the midpoint of Lent, the Church celebrates **Laetare Sunday**, which is taken from the first word of today's Mass entrance antiphon:

"Laetare, Ierusalem Rejoice, Jerusalem and all who love her."

The Prophet Isaiah announced (Is 66:10-11) to the Jews who were captive in Babylon, where they used to sit by the streams and weep, where they had hung up their harps and were too sad to sing because they were remembering all that they had squandered because of their sins.

But God didn't stop loving them. Out of love, he permitted the Jewish people to be captured by the Babylonians so they would have the time to grow closer to Him and turn away from their sinful life.

Today, on **Laetare Sunday**, recalls the joyous day the Jews were freed from Babylon. That joy is because of the unmeasurable love of God that would stop at nothing to redeem us.

When the human race was in a far worse situation than the Jews in Babylon, God himself sent someone greater to set us free. He sent his own Son. In today's Gospel of John, that same love is expressed to us when we hear, "God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish, but might have eternal life." St. John adds, "God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but so that the world might be saved through him."

When God the Father had a choice to allow us to die in eternal exile or allow his Son to take our place on death row and be brutally mocked and crucified, he loved us so much that He chose to save our life by allowing his Son to give his.





On March 19, 2021, the feast of St. Joseph, marks five years since the signing of "Amoris Laetitia" (The Joy of Love).

"The pandemic experience has highlighted the central role of the family as the domestic Church and has shown the importance of community ties between families, which make the Church an authentic 'family of families.'"

"Through the spiritual, pastoral, and cultural initiatives planned in the Year "Amoris Laetitia Family," Pope Francis intends to address all ecclesial communities throughout the world, exhorting each person to be a witness of family love."

"Resources will be shared within parishes, dioceses, universities, and in the context of ecclesial movements and family associations, on: family spirituality, formation and pastoral activity for marriage preparation, young people education in affective maturity, and on the holiness of married couples and families who live out the grace of the sacrament in their daily life."

The commemoration will conclude June 26, 2022, on the occasion of the "World Meeting of Families in Rome."


